
The first three in the series will be:

This biting social satire from 1964 was the first Israeli film to achieve major international success. Using slapstick humor, controversial then and now, this film nevertheless was one of the first ways in which Israeli culture examined the tension between European elites and immigrants from the Arab world, and it tackled head on issues of ethnicity, class, acculturation and integration in ways that had not been discussed before. 


## ***Ajami***
